Bill Eames is having a Super Bowl party at his home on Feb 1.

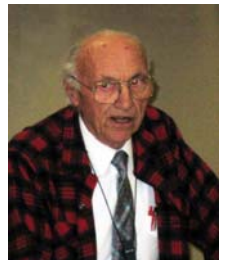
Mike Kearney and Chuck Vogel welcomed Debbie Cooper as a new member.

SPEAKER: Primo Facchini, Director, Alamo-Lafayette Cemetery District and a long time resident of Alamo, told us about cemetery issues in Alamo and Lafayette. The Lafayette cemetery was founded in 1854 and is 4.23 acres. It has about 500 spaces still available, which are estimated to be filled within 10 years. The Alamo cemetery was founded in 1857 is smaller, 2.75 acres. Both cemeteries have no ability to grow. Cremation is the preferred method now; 48-50% are handled in this way. The Catholic church now supports cremation practices. The Lafayette Cemetery has 2 office staff, 1 part time, 1 full-time, and 2 groundskeepers. There are 257 public cemetery districts in California and the cost of burial is approximately \$3000-\$5000. Non-residents are assessed approximately \$600 more for cemetery services. Board members are paid \$100 per meeting and Primo said they are currently seeking 1 or 2 more board members.
